Library Services and ITS are currently undertaking a project to upgrade UWE's existing research data repository. The purpose of the research data repository is to:

- create a record of information (a metadata record) about analysed research data that has been used, generated or collected as part of research at UWE Bristol
- store that analysed research data
- make the research data discoverable by others
- make the research data available for re-use by other researchers, where it is appropriate to do so.

UWE staff and post graduate students can login to the research data repository to create metadata records, and upload analysed research data. Anyone with an internet connection can access the Research Data Repository interface to search and browse for available research data.

The new research data repository will be hosted on an improved version of the same software as the existing research data repository (Eprints) but will be managed externally to UWE, by CoSector at the University of London. This relieves the pressure on ITS to support a bespoke system, which requires specialist knowledge and is considered unsustainable by ITS. The new research data repository will also inter-operate with other software (Arkivum), which will fulfil the requirement for long-term research data preservation.

Benefits of the project (outlined in the Business Case)

- Provides clearer, more attractive user interface, with improved help available for UWE staff and students who are depositing research data sets.
- Relieves pressure on ITS due to outsourcing of repository maintenance and enhancement work.

- Provides an enhanced, secure research data repository, with links to additional software for research data preservation.
- Provides a solution which allows the safe deposit, discoverability and sharing of research data, in line with various funder, publisher and UWE policies.
- Supports UWE’s ambitions in relation to increasing funded research activity, including ensuring UWE’s research is outstanding in terms of ethics and governance, is responsible, well-evidenced and authoritative, and open to scrutiny
- Research Excellence Framework requirements, until now, have encouraged the effective management and sharing of research data; it is anticipated that this requirement will become more formal and the project allows us to meet the developing needs in this area.

Not all UWE staff and students will interact with the research data repository. Its functions relating to uploading research data sets will only affect research active staff, non-taught Post-Graduate Research students, and those who are responsible for the general administration of the research data repository. The public interface, which will be available to anyone with an Internet connection, will be improved in terms of the quality of information available, along with the “look and feel” of the interface.

UWE staff and non-taught post-graduate students who engage with the research data repository should not experience major changes to current practice in relation to its use, however there will be some additional information that will need to be entered when depositing research data sets. Examples of this additional information include language of the research data, the School or College where the depositor is based, and a brief description of the project that the research data relates to. This information should be quick and easy to provide, it is anticipated that this should have minimal impact on those people who are uploading research data. The intention behind this is to improve:

- the information which supports individual research data sets,
- the experience of people who are searching for and re-using research data sets
- citations relating to research data sets
- the experience of the research data repository manager and administrator, as the records added to the data repository will be more complete and of better quality.
