

Resources for Schools and Colleges

The [UWE Library Catalogue](#) is the best source of information about the books, journals (magazines), and other audio visual materials available in UWE libraries. You can search for books and other materials on any topic and for a particular book if you know author and title. Reference use of any of our printed books and magazines is available to any member of the public.

Web gateways and search engines are useful starting points for finding your way around the Internet and identifying reliable sources of information.

Databases provide information about what has been published in magazines and journals. One or two of these are available free of charge, so it would be worth exploring these, for example:

- [Google Scholar](#) provides a simple way to search for academic literature, helping you find relevant work across the world of scholarly research, though not all the articles listed will be available to you, if you're not students at UWE.
- The [Directory of Open Access Journals](#) is a list of freely available, full text, quality controlled scholarly journals. All subject areas and languages are covered. There are over 3,400 journals in the directory

MySkills

UWE's [mySkills](#) web resource brings together a wide range of study skills support available to students at the university. Much of the material is free for anyone to use and is particularly useful for 6th form students considering applying to university.

iSkillZone

UWE's [iSkillZone](#) is an electronic collection of useful study and research skills information. You will find useful sections on evaluation skills, how to reference accurately and how to avoid plagiarism. It is free for anyone to use.

Public libraries are an excellent place to find information and material about school and exam topics. Many local authorities subscribe to online databases which library members can use free of charge, both within the libraries and at home.
