

Why go to university?

Only you can decide if going to university is right for you. Remember, it's important to research all your options when making decisions.

When thinking about university as an option please consider these points:

- 1. What does going to university mean to you? Passion for subject, continue your learning and development, to pursue a particular career, to be intellectually challenged, to learn essential life skills, to help get or find a better job. Trying to dissect what's important to you will help you consider the right courses, universities and locations.
- 2. What will study at degree level be like? Specialising in a subject, developing skills in critical and analytical thinking to explore the subject at depth, research, professional training and industry understanding.
- 3. Employment prospects are strong. Current statistics show that unemployment 6 months after graduation is low at 5.1%, and 73.9% of graduates needed their degree to enter their job as they are working in professional or managerial roles.
- 4. You don't need to have a clear career goal in mind when you start university. Many employers recruit graduates from any degree background. Some of these include Asda, Deloitte, Sky and the Civil Service.
- 5. Loan repayments are manageable, at just £3.60 per month if you earn £27,000 a year. About 80% of students will not pay the loan back in full before the loan is wiped out.
- 6. You'll develop key skills and qualities valued by employers by studying a degree, undertaking work placements and extracurricular activities during your time at university.
