*Keynote Speaker: Dr Adam Geraghty

Title: Supporting self-management of low back pain with digital interventions: Understanding the RCT evidence

Dr Adam Geraghty is Associate Professor in Psychology and Behavioural Medicine within the Primary Care Research Centre at the University of Southampton. He was Chief Investigator on the NIHR HTA funded SupportBack 2 trial to determine the clinical and cost effectiveness of a digital intervention to support self-management of low back pain. Adam is an academic psychologist with expertise in supporting behavioural self-management. He focuses primarily on developing and trialling interventions for musculoskeletal conditions and mental health problems.
