
Research spotlight



CAR recently celebrated the completion of a five-year grant funded by the National Institutes of Health in the US into the psychosocial impacts of craniofacial microsomia (CFM), a congenital condition affecting the appearance and function of the ears and jaw.

The 'Craniofacial microsomia: Accelerating Research and Education (CARE)' programme achieved four key aims:

- 1. To understand the lived experience and treatment journey of US adolescents and young adults with CFM and their families.
- 2. To identify the factors contributing to psychological distress and resiliency.
- 3. To determine the extent to which current healthcare provision meets individuals' needs.
- 4. To establish a US-wide patient and family CFM registry.



The CARE programme has been pivotal in informing person-centred care delivery and creating opportunities for future research. The CARE team included patient/parent advocates, researchers and healthcare professionals from seven countries, led by Dr Nicola Stock (UWE Bristol) and Professor Carrie Heike (Seattle, USA).


