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#### Member Profile

Welcome to the second edition of The Hyphen: Newsletter of UWE Psycho-Social Studies. In each edition we aim to profile one group member representing a different aspect of the psycho-social research group. This time we focus on a recent PhD graduate, Jane Woodend, and also offer information about the PhD programme and the MSc in psycho-social studies.

Following her earlier career as an Occupational Therapist and NHS Manager, Jane qualified as a psychodynamic counsellor in 2000 and then completed a post-graduate training in 2002. She has been in practice since then and has worked with a wide variety of presenting problems in individuals and couples. She is co-director of a counselling practice in Stroud, which offers a counselling service for individuals, couples, children and families as well as running a lively continuing professional development programme.

Jane has an MSc in Applied Psychology (Learning Disabilities) and recently completed her PhD at the University of the West of England. Her research into endings in psychody-



namic counselling broke new ground in terms of both psycho-social methodology and findings. As a counsellor undertaking psycho-social research - by problematizing the boundary between the individual and the social – she was able to show what troubles and what interests people, and how social forces operate. Ideas of reflexive practice straddle both counselling and psycho-social research equally well. Jane remains intrigued by the similarities and differences of these two strands of meaning making, from the individual level to the social realm.

Jane has previously held posts within a county-wide counselling service as Service Manager, Head of Training and also, in conjunction with the University of the West of England, was Programme Manager for the country's first Foundation Degree in Psychodynamic Counselling. She is currently involved in the publication of research papers and has inputs at UWE on the MSc in Professional Development (Psychosocial Studies), where she teaches key concepts in psychoanalysis and research methodology.

#### **UWE PhD Programme in Psycho-Social Studies**

Psycho-social research continues to run strongly at UWE, having been launched from the Centre for Psycho-Social Studies, originally set up by Prof Paul Hoggett and Prof Simon Clarke. Still a relative newcomer to the research field, psycho-social studies has maintained a strong presence and at UWE this is demonstrated through the PhD Programme.

The programme offers a supportive and innovative approach for PhD students at UWE and beyond – past and current students have joined us from other universities. The programme provides an intensive two day opportunity for students to meet together, in May and November each year. During these meetings there are workshops and lectures on research methodologies, latest developments and input from successful doctoral graduates. There is a strong emphasis on enabling reflexive practice through the use of Balint groups – a small group process that helps researchers understand more about the conscious and unconscious challenges they face in the research process. There is also the opportunity to present data for analysis by the group, providing an important triangulation of findings outside of the supervisory dyad. A guest speaker contributes adding a different perspective and stimuli, the last ones have been, for example:

Louise Grisoni (Researching Poetically: The poetics of work-life balance), Paul Hoggett (Developments in psycho-social methodologies), Sue Jervis (Learning From Experience: Gender in Psycho-Social research), Anne-Marie Cummins (Parenting calls forth 'childing').

It is a fundamental moment and space to get together as a community of practice and to address the challenges of a PhD journey. These meetings also create a closer relationship with the faculty, the Bristol Social Research Group and UWE in general.

Nigel Williams and Anne-Marie Cummins are approaching Karnac press with a view to publishing Volume Two of 'Researching Beneath the Surface'. The original ground-breaking volume, published in 2009, was edited by Paul Hoggett and Simon Clarke and featured the work of many of our then PhD students. Since that time, thinking and practice in psychosocial research methods has moved on - and we have a new crop of researchers and research fellows working in the psychosocial sphere here at UWE. It is therefore very timely to consider publishing new contributions and ways of thinking about 'researching beneath the surface' and we will be in touch shortly with more news and a more concrete invitation to submit proposals for chapters.

Abstract: The hyphen in psycho-social studies signifies both the irreducibility of the psychological to the social (and vice versa) and their complementarity, that is, the impossibility of there being the one without the other. In contrast to Stephen Frosh and Lisa Baraitser, the author argues that critique is not best advanced by the dissolving of boundaries and the blurring of differences. The retention of the hyphen insists upon the difference, a difference that can never be overcome, yet one which continually invites engagement and exploration:
