January – 'Moving forward Collectively: Looking ahead to Research with Impact'


In this workshop we gave an overview of our current plans for research over the next 4 years, centring around two key priorities – use of social media and evaluation of evidence-based supportive interventions. We discussed ways to ensure this work is of maximum benefit to the Appearance Collective charities. We also presented the results of our recent survey of the support needs of people impacted by visible differences.



May - Support for parents of children with visible differences

Maia and Clare ran this workshop and provided an overview of the research related to the support needs of parents and carers of children with a visible difference. We discussed the challenges and support practice, and provided an update on evidence-based support developed at the Centre for Appearance Research, including The Parenting Toolkit (see below).

The next workshop for the Appearance Collective charities will delivered Prof by Harcourt and Dr Kathleen (https://liberalarts.oregonstate.edu/users/kathleenbogart). Kathleen is an Associate Professor of Psychology and Director of the Disability and Social Interaction Lab at Oregon State University. She is a social/health psychologist specializing in disability, ableism, and rare disorders such as facial paralysis. Di co-leads (with Amy Slater) the VTCT Foundation research team at CAR and is a health psychologist

with expertise around research people's experiences of visible differences and the development and evaluation of supportive interventions.

The workshop will be based on research that Kathleen has conducted in collaboration with the VTCT Foundation team at CAR on people's experiences of explaining or disclosing their visible difference, and what support and societal changes could help remove the onus of disclosure from them.


Lipoedema UK -
