10 Tops To improve your marks for Law students

These tips will help you do your best during your studies at UWE Bristol. There is a whole range of support and resources out there for you.

Ask for help: don't be afraid to **contact your tutor, peers, Library and Learning Hub staff**. No matter what stage you're at, get in touch – there is lots of support available.

Read your assessment brief carefully and make sure you <u>understand the assignment</u> <u>title</u> and what you need to do.

Start your assignments early to give yourself time to reflect and develop your work fully. Your first draft will need to be developed and mistakes fixed. Find out more about **the 3 stages of improving your writing:** reviewing, editing and proofreading.

Take every opportunity to engage with feedback you have received so that you know what you do well and can focus on where you need to improve. Watch the **What is feedback?** video to better understand sources of feedback.
